Do not put yourself or others in harm's way (flood water, fire – grass, bushfire or electric)	Are any animals injured or down? Are you able to humanely destroy injured stock if required?	Is it a general power cut or is it just your farm?
Who needs to be contacted?	Are boundary fences intact and are electric fences working?	What is the highest priority for power?
Staff, milk company field officer, local Council How can they be contacted? Who will do it and when?	Do any stock need to be moved? Where to, when and who will move them?	Milking? Vat refrigeration? Water pumping to troughs and/or for household use?
Can staff work? Can they access the property and/or do	Is fresh water available and is supply adequate Power available? Yes/no?	Communications Are landline phones working?
